As a relatively new person in the bromeliad world and a native Brazilian, I've been curious to know what happened to bromeliad growing in Brazil after the Brazilian Bromeliad Society disbanded in the late 90s. In its heyday, the SBBr had thousands of members, a quarterly journal and led conservation, scientific and education programs.

In July 2018, I tracked down 4 prominent members of the club in Rio de Janeiro. The effort led to meeting Marcia and Vera Leuzinger, Rafael Oliveira de Faria, Roberto Menescal and Paulo Tosta, fantastic bromeliad lovers who opened their doors to show their plant treasures to us. And they are not just growing – they are also developing new cultivars and hybrids.

Most importantly, we can verify that the love of bromeliads is alive and well in Brazilian lands, the native habitat of so many of its species.
